April Services

April 7 – Rev. Eugene "Guy" LaMothe: "The Light Inside The Dark: Solar Eclipse 2024." Throughout recorded history civilizations have regarded total solar eclipses with fear and dread, and viewed them as a disruption of the established order. A solar eclipse happens when the moon passes directly between the Earth and the Sun casting a 120 mile wide shadow upon the land. It's a rare and spectacular phenomenon, inspiring in all who witness a sense of wonderment and awe. The expression 'awe' is rooted in the Greek word 'achos' from which we get the word 'ache'. An awe-inspiring experience opens an ache in us to know more. As shared experiences of nature, they expand our perspective and pull out of us deeper meanings. Allowing us all, as we prepare for the upcoming solar eclipse, to glimpse a little of the light inside the dark.

April 14 - Rev.David Weissbard: "What's Next When Our "Fit's Over?" According to the internet, Charles Johnson [or Christopher Bullock] wrote "'tis impossible to be sure of anything but death and taxes" in his play "The Cobbler of Preston" in 1716. Daniel Defoe, in The Political History of the Devil, wrote in 1726: "Things as certain as death and taxes, can be more firmly believed." Benjamin Franklin wrote in a letter to Jean-Baptiste Leroy in 1789, "In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes."

For something so universally acknowledged and so central to much religion, death is something most of us don't talk about much, although many people think a lot about it. On April 14th, we'll consider it.

How to Transform a Cake Mix

During a service Frances Mercer shared a recipe with us to transform a cake mix and other ingredients to a delicious dessert.

- One can cherry pie filling, pour in 9 x 13 baking dish
- One 20 oz. can crushed pineapple, pour over the cherry pie filling
- Sprinkle one yellow cake mix over the filling
- Distribute whole pecans evenly over the cake mix
- Cut up 1 stick butter (into small pieces) and distribute over the whole mixture.

Bake 1 hour at 350°.

Thanks for strengthening our congregation by being active physically with us, and thanks for helping to cover our group expenses with your financial donations and pledge checks. Building and Grounds

Heather [Winn] and I had the annual evaluation meeting with John Crupi. We will have another meet-up in a few weeks.

The tree that fell during a January storm has been cut up (I am told this was by fairies or gremlins or other creatures). The remains need to be moved off the lawn before it is lawnmowing season.

The lawnmower will be going in for the annual maintenance in the next couple of months.

The parking lot is scheduled for striping this year. This includes painting the curb with cautionary yellow.

Our Warren has performed the annual gypsum spreading under the front yard trees that are impacted by road salting.

There are plans to build some new picnic tables. The existing tables have gone beyond their useful life and need to be replaced. More on this later.

The building needs exterior maintenance. This includes the siding; much of this is allowing water penetration, falling off or peeling paint or all of them. The stone wall above the windows on the sanctuary exterior must be removed. It is allowing water to seep into the supporting studs. This was discovered during the reconstruction after the first flood. There were temporary repairs to buy time, but removal and proper finishing of the outside wall is the only appropriate answer. It will be sad to lose this lovely structure, but it has to go to prevent the wall from collapsing.

All Souls UU is serving as Fiscal Sponsor for two grant applications due March 1 to the SLC Arts organization.

One of the grants will provide funds to pay performers for the Watertown Juneteenth Celebration that will take place at ASUU on Saturday, June 15 starting at noon.

The second grant will provide funds to pay performers for a Musicking Experiences series to take place at ASUU, with a Cinco de Mayo Eco-Drumming event already scheduled. A goal of the series is to welcome families to our ASUU community for an enriching, free activity. Entertainment the day before the Eclipse is a goal, although it isn't clear that either of the two other performing groups (a string trio and Northern Blend Chorus) who have agreed to perform sometime can make it, and I'm uncertain if we'll know for sure that we've gotten the grant award in time to plan around that.

Grant Application for Publicity

We have been doing the Generosity Project for many years. One of the local charities for which we have sometimes voted is NCPR public radio. When I first called them years ago to ask where we should send that first check, they had invited us to use those dollars to underwrite part of the costs of any one program (at \$18 or \$25 per notice). So, fine, some years we have had underwriting credits hopefully heard when the audience is biggest to hear it, like during the Friday news sometime between 5 and 6 PM, when neighbors are figuring out which worthwhile things they want to do. Our most recent underwriting there ended in early February. Two families of friends and financial supporters in our congregation have mentioned hearing these underwritings before they joined us.

But NCPR is broadcast through over 20 towers, relays, and transmitters from Boonville to Lake Champlain to perhaps Montreal, and we can't expect hundreds of listeners to be enticed to move here from Plattsburgh, can we?

A committee at the Canton church was hoping to try NCPR underwriting notices which would list the area villages where UUs met, if the various UU churches paid into a fund at Canton.

Then Eleanor Allen found that the NYS Universalists had sacks of money, saved from our and our Universalist ancestors' pledges, and they were offering grants. Then our board agreed that we could apply for a modest grant, to encourage NCPR listeners to visit the closest UU congregation. Then Eleanor helped send emails to all UU congregations within the NCPR broadcast area. Then a representative of the Canton church said good idea—we'll try that here, if we can get such a grant. Then there were no replies from the seasonal UU group at Saranac Lake, nor from the group near Glens Falls. Then Francis Ashland offered to write the grant application, for which he has way more recent experience than I, and he could add a request for another \$3k, so that we can pay fees to show ourselves in local street fairs on Public Square. Then spokespeople of the Plattsburgh Fellowship (not "church") made very friendly noises. Francis sent in the application to the Universalists a day early! Yay! Thanks!

So if the Universalists agree during March with our grant application, \$3k of this will go to NCPR for two notices each Friday sometime between 5 and 6 PM. Using words mostly suggested by a member at Plattsburgh, one message will be "underwritten by Watertown's All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church, gathering as neighbors in spiritual community, reminding each other what matters most in life. Allsoulsuu.org; 315-788-2742." And the other message can say "Underwritten by the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Plattsburgh, gathering as neighbors in spiritual community, reminding each other what matters most in life. UUplattsgurgh.org; 518-561-6920." And if other area congregations want to join equally, only two will be done per Friday, and in that case not each CONGREGATION EACH week. The reasoning is that if you hear something twice then it's memorable but if you hear it too many times then you'll want to yell at your radio. And if you have no interest in those infernal computer machines, you can know the number to telephone so that our friendly volunteers can call you back when they are in. And if you can work a cellphone but haven't extra time to research where those UUs hang out, you are given the website.

Late note: The Universalist decision was expected in March, on our application for \$6,000. On the evening of Saturday Feb 24, we have their decision to award \$3200! Will we resolve this allocation by manly contests of arm-wrestling?
